A Theological Insight of "The Hunter's Story"

In the deer hunting community, the month of November is known as "Rut-vember"; those first few weeks of the month when you are most likely to see deer in daylight (and when most deer get hit by cars!). In pagan lore, it is almost universally understood that when a man or group of hunters are successful, there is some form of cosmic coincidence that made it all possible. Native American and Inuit culture, for example, believe the animals "present themselves" for harvest. The ancients asserted such things as, "The stars or celestial bodies were aligned" or ascribe success to ancestral intervention. The spirit of the American frontier lives on today with sentiments such as, "I was just at the right place at the right time." Ask any hunter about a successful encounter in the woods and the reply is almost always universally the same: there's a story to it with personal meaning far beyond the historical events themselves. It is always an intricate culmination of preparation, time, effort, and the right splitsecond that usually leaves the person speechless in the moment, and only in hindsight, upon careful reflection, are all the pieces artistically woven together.

I could give you countless examples of personal anecdotes like this, but what's far more interesting is how this all ties together theologically. Since there is such a universal experience for hunters across all times and places, there must be some truth to it. Consider Isaac's question on one of the hills in the land of Moriah when he asks his father, "Behold, the fire and the wood, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God will provide for himself the lamb for a burnt offering, my son" (Gen 22:7b-8a). Abraham in that moment confessed and believed that God would provide the animal for harvest/the offering at just the right moment.

The concept of "right moment" is designated as a separate word in the original language of the New Testament. Whereas chronos is sequential time, hence the word chronology in English, kairos is the circumstantially coincidental time that English has a hard time describing. We understand the concept as something like "the timing was just right."

The most common thread of experience for hunters in all times and places is that they were just at the right place at the right time. As someone once famously said, "Success is when preparation meets opportunity." You can sit on stand for a hundred hours without seeing the game you're pursuing, but then it all comes together in the twinkling of an eye.

Animals have always been biblically understood as God's gifts. We believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth (Gen 1:1). The works of God in creation include the land, animals, and all that we have. While we may be landowners or animal keepers (as pets or on farms), ultimately God "owns" them all. We are given to be stewards for a time.

When a man is hunting, while he relies on his skills and knowledge of the land and the animal itself, the biggest aspect of a successful hunt is completely out of his control. A man cannot force the animals to walk by him or come to his calls. The creatures simply go about their daily lives.

So, how do we explain the "hunter's experience" when words cannot describe how "timing is everything" without repeating more cliches? Psalm 50:10-11 records the word of the Lord saying, "For every beast of the field is mine, the cattle on a thousand hills. I know all the birds of the hills, and all that moves in the field is mine." The animals are His. He knows their movements. He knows their habits. He knows when and where they will move next. He knows what man can only guess at. All the scouting in the world does not guarantee success. Instead, God provides at His right moment.

If the hunter hopes to be successful, he should pray that the Lord Who owns the beasts of the field and knows all the birds of the hills, would send by one of them. And then, when all the preparation meets an opportunity, and success is reached, he can boldly confess that the Lord provided for Himself the animal for the harvest. It's far more enchanting to credit chance, it's far more romantic to ascribe it to ancestral mediation, but it's not proper for Christians to speak this way. Instead, confess Christ! Give Him the praise and thanksgiving. A blessed "Rut-vember" to you all!





Wednesday Night Service & Bible Study



Using Our God-Given Gifts




Bags should contain (only)



Five High school youth attended the summer **Higher Things youth conference hosted at Calvin University** in Grand Rapids Michigan in July 2025. The conference had 770 Attendees from 79 Churches. The conference registration includes meals, lodging, and all conference activities.

Each day had time for:

• Worship / Prayer Offices • Education / Catechesis • Fun & Free Time

For Worship, we participated in 2 Divine Services (Setting 3 and Setting 1), 2 Matins Services, 2 Vespers Services, 3 Evening Prayer Services, and 3 Compline Services.

For Education, we attended 4 Plenary Sessions (1-hour Large Group Bible Study), 1 Ask-the-Pastor Panel, and 5 Breakaway sessions (45-min each) covering a variety of topics.

For Free Time, we participated in a Lego Master challenge, rock wall climbing, gaga ball tournament, swimming, archery tag, and other fun activities to choose from each day.

Everyone enjoyed conference, had fun, and learned a lot! It was great to be with so many other youth that appreciate confessional Lutheran liturgy, hymnody, and teaching.

Thank you to the congregation for your support of the youth.

Church History - Timeline #1 (submitted by Sherry Palmer) The Journey toward the beginning of Zion - 1847-1872

April 26, 1847 – The formal adoption of "The Constitution of The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio, and other States" at Chicago, Illinois, by 15 congregations, consisting of 6,000 people, served by 12 pastors, the Rev. Dr. C.F.W. Walther, president.

1847: Gold was discovered in California, the French Nation was having their problems, and finally did overthrow their king, Louis Philippe. The United States was a growing nation and there was quite an influx of German and Prussian immigrants coming into the new country. Hundreds moved to the small central Ohio city of
Columbus. There were two factions of these Protestant Christians from Europe – some were Lutherans who believed in the Holy Scriptures as interpreted in the Augsburg Confession and there were
others who leaned toward the teachings of Zwingli and Calvin, known generally as the founders of the
Reformed Church. Because of the situation – adherents of the two beliefs coming to Columbus at the same
time and settling in the south end of Columbus (now known as German Village) and joining St. Paul's United Lutheran and Reformed Church at Mound and High Streets – it became necessary for the Rev. Conrad Mees, pastor of St. Paul's, to sever connections with the Lutheran Joint Synod of Ohio and other States.

The members of St. Paul's United Lutheran and Reformed Church who believed in the strict Lutheran doctrine and wished to remain with the Joint Synod, organized a new church, which was later to be known as the German Evangelical Lutheran Trinity Congregation, with the Rev. Chrisian Spielmann as their leader. Rev. Spielmann was then a professor in the Joint Synod seminary in Columbus. The new Lutheran congregation began holding regular services January 28, 1848. In this era times in Columbus were very hard and money was scarce. Therefore, there was no church building anticipated for some time, and so services were held in the seminary building at South High and Sycamore streets. Even to start a new congregation was thought by the people of Columbus a "way out" idea, but despite all the conversation and speculations, there were 44 people who did start the new church.

A Constitution was adopted which stated that the preaching and teaching of the church was to be in accord with the Evangelical Lutheran Church and that the pastor must always be a member of the Joint Synod of Ohio and Other States. (the pastor must be a member of the American Lutheran Church, grandchild of the Joint Synod) Only those persons who accept the confessions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church and live an exemplary Christian life can be received into membership of <u>Trinity Lutheran Church</u>. It would not tolerate the preaching in English.

February 1849, the congregation (Trinity) rented the building of the Independent Protestant Church on East Mound Street for their worship services at \$120.00 per year. As the congregation grew, the rent increased, until at the end of eight years the rent was raised to \$200.00 per year.

In 1849 there was no money for janitorial services, so members of the congregation served one month at a time. Later a janitor was hired for a salary of \$16.00 per year.

In 1852 a choir director was engaged at a salary of \$25.00 per year. Creation of this position shows how much the congregation has always treasured good sacred music.

April of 1856 a lot was purchased on the northeast corner of Third and Fulton Streets for a price of \$2,300.00. In June the congregation voted to erect a two-story church 56 x 120 feet. The first floor was to serve as a school room, both for parochial school and Sunday School. The corner stone was laid in July – 8.5 years after the organization of the congregation. There is no record of the exact cost of the church, but it has been estimated that the total cost, including lot, came to \$12,685.09.

July 28, 1856, the cornerstone was laid at Third and Fulton. Its first pastor, Rev. W. F. Lehmann, was also a professor at the Lutheran Theological Seminary.

In 1863, the first organ was installed at a cost of \$1,100; and about the same time a short-lived parochial school was established.

March 29, 1863, the vestry passed the following resolution: That henceforth no one shall be received as a member of this congregation who belongs to a secret society, and that no one shall remain a member of this congregation who, being a member, joins such a society.

June 16, 1872, the congregation, by a strong majority, endorsed the resolution of the vestry regarding secret societies. On September 22, the congregation, on the petition of Professor Lehmann and the Synod, resolved to dismiss their pastor, with great reluctance and heartfelt gratitude for his faithful services during nearly 26 years, henceforth to serve as Professor of Theology in the Capital University, only.

Church History - Timeline #2 (submitted by Sherry Palmer) The Journey toward the beginning of Zion - 1872-1882

June 16, 1872, the congregation, by a strong majority, endorsed the resolution of the vestry regarding secret societies. On September 22, the congregation, on the petition of Professor Lehmann and the Synod, resolved to dismiss their pastor, with great reluctance and heartfelt gratitude for his faithful services during nearly 26 years, henceforth to serve as Professor of Theology in the Capital University, only.

June 1873, Rev. R. Herbst, of Hamilton, Ohio was called as his successor at a salary of \$1,200 a year.

Rev. Richard Arnold Ferdinand Herbst was born in Cologne, Germany, Jan. 31, 1828. At the age of 20 he came to New York. After he had graduated from Harvard University he carried on mission work in Castle Garden among the immigrants. From there he came to Columbus to prepare himself for the ministry at Capital University. In 1856 he was ordained and in succession served congregations at Marysville, Reading, Cincinnati, and Hamilton, OH. In 1873 he came to Columbus as pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church.

1876, the spire was built, at a cost of \$3,470. Three bells were placed in the new tower; the largest bell was a gift from Mr. Nick Schlee and the two smaller ones were contributed by the young people of the congregation.

1880 Rev. Herbst's son became assistant pastor without additional salary.

1880 a doctrinal controversy on the question of predestination began between the Lutheran Synod of Missouri and that of Ohio, the former leaving the old landmarks of the genuine Lutheran faith and following to a great extent in the footsteps of John Calvin. The Ohio Synod, not wishing to give up its old standards of pure doctrine, separated from the Missouri Synod with which it had been united in the Synodical Conference, a general

body of Lutherans. This controversy aroused discussion in the Trinity congregation also, but Rev. Herbst, siding with Missouri, frustrated the attempt of the congregation to take a decided stand for Ohio, to which Synod it belonged.

1882, a meeting was held in which Rev. Trebel, president of the Western District of the Ohio Synod, presided. There were present 103 voting members or heads of families. It was decided by 71 against 32 votes that the congregation stand by the Ohio Synod. Rev. Herbst having shortly before severed his connection with the Ohio Synod, his office was, according to the constitution of the congregation, declared vacant. It was resolved, therefore, to have another meeting in 2 weeks for the purpose of electing a new pastor at Trinity.

June 18, 1882, a considerable number of Trinity people withdrew their membership and under the leadership of Pastor Herbst they established Zion Lutheran Church.

June 25, 1882 – Purchase, rededication service of St. Paul's Protestant Church at Third and Mound Streets to "The Evangelical Lutheran Zion Church" (cost \$6,000).


